

Antitrust: Commission opens investigation into Insurance Ireland data pooling system

The European Commission has opened a formal antitrust investigation into Insurance Ireland to assess whether the conditions of access to its Insurance Link data pooling system may restrict competition, in breach of EU rules. EU Competition Commissioner Margrethe Vestager said: "We are investigating whether companies wishing to offer their services on the Irish motor insurance market may have been unfairly prevented from accessing a data pool managed by Insurance Ireland for its member companies. This could potentially reduce Irish drivers' choice of motor insurance policies at competitive prices."


€50 million EU Fund for Irish Beef Farmers

A fund of €50 million for Irish beef farmers has been agreed by the European Commission. The Irish government will have the possibility to match this fund, which should bring the total amount of financial support for Irish beef farmers to €100 million. Speaking this afternoon, the EU Commissioner for Agriculture and Rural Development, Phil Hogan, said that "this fund recognises the particular difficulty that Irish beef farmers have experienced during an unprecedented and sustained period of low prices, principally driven by events beyond their control. This fund will support a fragile but very important sector and protect its long-term viability. The European Commission has concluded that the sector is in need of an immediate response."

Phone calls and text messaging costs fall further

From yesterday (15 May), a new maximum price applies to all international calls and text messages within the EU. Irish consumers making a phone call, either from a mobile or a landline, to another EU country will pay a maximum of 19 cents per minute (+VAT) and 6 cents per text message. (+VAT). Telecoms operators across the EU will have to notify consumers of the new price caps. The maximum price is capped only for personal usage, i.e. for private customers. Business customers are excluded.



Ten local authorities around Ireland to receive Wifi4EU vouchers under second round

Ten local authorities around Ireland have qualified for a total of 22 Wifi4EU vouchers under the second call for applications. They are: Galway, Kilkenny, Leitrim, Meath, Monaghan, Roscommon, Sligo, South Dublin, Westmeath and Wicklow. This brings the share of Irish local authorities to have benefited from the scheme to over 50%. The vouchers, which are each worth €15,000, are to be used to cover equipment and installation costs of Wi-Fi hotspots in public areas such as libraries, public parks, etc.

Commissioner Hogan proposes "Farm Carbon Forest" initiative

EU Agriculture Commissioner Phil Hogan has called on Member States to look into the possibility of a 'Farm Carbon Forest Initiative' to reward farmers who successfully reduce, save, store or sequester carbon. He said: "Emissions from agriculture account for around 10 per cent of total non-CO2 emissions in the EU. If we want to achieve carbon neutrality by mid-century, as promised in the Paris Agreement, we have to use all means at our disposal to not only increase carbon efficiency but to also bring absolute emissions down whilst also securing food security."

Antitrust: Commission fines Barclays, RBS, Citigroup, JPMorgan and MUFG for participating in foreign exchange spot trading cartel

In two settlement decisions, the European Commission has fined five banks for taking part in two cartels in the Spot Foreign Exchange market for 11 currencies - Euro, British Pound, Japanese Yen, Swiss Franc, US, Canadian, New Zealand and Australian Dollars, and Danish, Swedish and Norwegian crowns. The first decision imposes a total fine of €811,197,000 on Barclays, The Royal Bank of Scotland (RBS), Citigroup and JPMorgan. The second decision imposes a total fine of €257,682,000 on Barclays, RBS and MUFG Bank (formerly Bank of Tokyo-Mitsubishi).

Commission registers European Citizens' Initiative to "Save the bees!"

The European Commission is to register a European Citizens' Initiative entitled 'Save the bees! Protection of biodiversity and improvement of habitats for insects in Europe'. The organisers are calling on the Commission to 'adopt legislation to maintain and improve habitats for insects as indicators of an undamaged environment'. Once the registration has taken place on 27 May, the organisers will have one year to collect a minimum of one million statements of support from at least seven Member States.

Commission to harmonise last pioneer frequency band needed for 5G deployment

The European Commission this week adopted the Implementing Decision to harmonise the 26 GHz frequency band for wireless networks. The decision finalises the EU-wide coordination of all three pioneer bands (700 MHz, 3.6 GHz and 26 GHz) needed for 5G rollout in the Member States.

Rise in share of young Irish adults living with their parents

New Eurostat figures show that the share of young Irish adults (25-34) still living with their parents rose from 20% in 2009 to 28.5% in 2017. Young adults (25-34) in Denmark (3.2%), Finland (4.7%) and Sweden (6.0%) were the least likely to still be living with their parents while those in Croatia (59.7%), Slovakia (57.0%) and Greece (56.3%) were the most. The EU average was also 28.5% - although higher for young men than young women. The figures also show that the average age of a young Irish person leaving the parental home is now just over 26 years.

New tool to help EU countries crack down on VAT fraud

The European Commission has launched a new tool to allow Member States to rapidly exchange and jointly process VAT data, leading to earlier detection of suspicious networks. Commissioner Moscovici said: "This new tool will increase the speed at which authorities can uncover and act on suspicious activity. But this progress does not lessen the need for deeper and more fundamental reform of the EU's VAT system, to ensure it can cope with the vast amounts of trade taking place across borders in the EU."

Three Irish partners in EU-funded renewable energy project

UCD, WIT and ESB Networks Ltd are all partners in the EU-funded RE-SERVE project. The project is developing ways to tackle the technical electricity-grid-based challenges that stand in the way of achieving 100% renewable electricity in Europe. Electricity grids are not currently designed to meet the needs of renewable energies. The project, which also includes partners in Germany, Romania and Italy, has received almost \in 5 million in EU funding and will conclude this September.

Irish ocean energy project reaches finals of EU Sustainable Energy Awards

Galway based project Foresea (Funding Ocean Renewable Energy through Strategic European Action) has been shortlisted for a European Sustainable Energy Award. The Foresea project, which has received €11 million in EU funding, is working to bring marine energy technologies closer to commercialisation. EU-funded colorectal cancer project to begin trials in Cork, Dublin and Galway

The EU-funded Colossus colorectal cancer research project is currently carrying out patient trials in hospitals in Cork, Dublin and Galway. Prof Annette Byrne (RCSI) said: "We aim to identify new treatments and develop diagnostic assays for this intractable disease. Metastatic colorectal cancer is a highly prevalent, and complex pathology with a high economic impact both within a European and global context." The COLOSSUS project is led by the RCSI and includes partners in seven other countries as well as Ireland (RCSI, UCD, Irish Clinical Oncology Research Group and Pintail Ltd). The trials are sponsored and coordinated by Cancer Trials Ireland.

EU adopts measures to support generic pharmaceuticals producers

The European Council this week adopted a regulation introducing an exception to the protection granted to an original medicine by a supplementary protection certificate (SPC) for export purposes and/or for stockpiling. This means that EU-based manufacturers of generics and biosimilars will be entitled to manufacture a generic or biosimilar version of an SPC-protected medicine during the term of the SPC either for the purpose of exporting to a non-EU market where protection has expired or never existed or (during the six months before the SPC expires) for the purpose of creating a stock that will be put on the EU market after the SPC has expired.

Council adopts measures to reduce risk in the banking system

The European Council has adopted a comprehensive legislative package to reduce risks in the banking sector and further reinforce banks' ability to withstand potential shocks. The package contains amendments to the capital requirement legislation (regulation 575/2013 and directive 2013/36/EU) which reinforce the capital and liquidity positions of banks, and strengthens the framework for the recovery and resolution of banks in difficulty (directive 2014/59/EU and regulation 806/2014).
